

REPORT: AIRLINES: EUROPE

What you need to know

February 2023

This report presents a roundup of what's been happening to Europe's airlines over the last month.

Major network airlines

Air France-KLM

Profits return in Q4 on strong revenue growth

Air France-KLM reported a 47% rise in fourth quarter revenue to \in 7.13 billion, with passenger revenue rising by an even stronger 65% to \in 5.87 billion. The company improved on 2021's \in 127 million fourth quarter net loss to record a \in 496 million net profit.

New Ottawa route announced

Air France will launch a new route from Paris Charles de Gaulle airport to Ottawa, Canada, on June 27. It will offer five-weekly flights and will be the only airline offering non-stop flights to Ottawa from Europe. Air France will also restart seasonal thrice-weekly flights from Paris to Quebec City on May 2.

Sister airline KLM will this summer operate 13 weekly flights from Amsterdam to Toronto, seven per week to both Calgary and Vancouver, five per week to Montreal and four per week to Edmonton.

IAG

Profits return in Q4 on strong revenue growth

Fourth quarter revenue at IAG increased by 81% year-over-year to \le 6.39 billion, which was also 3% higher than in the same period in 2019. After reporting a \le 278 million operating loss in 2021, IAG returned a \le 486 million profit for the final quarter of 2022.

IAG to take over Air Europa, considering TAP

Globalia has agreed to sell its remaining 80% interest in Spanish airline Air Europe to IAG, giving it 100% of the carrier's equity. IAG had previously acquired a 20% stake in August 2022. IAG will pay €400 million for the remaining shares. It expects regulatory and other approvals to take up to 18 months. IAG CEO Luis Gallego has not ruled out making a move for TAP Air Portugal, whose plans for privatization should be revealed in the coming months.

British Airways resuming mainland China services

On April 23, British Airways will restart daily flights from London Heathrow to Shanghai. A four-times weekly service to Beijing Daxing airport will follow on June 3.

BA agrees new South African codeshare

Following the demise of South African franchise partner Comair, British Airways has signed a codeshare deal with Airlink to boost connectivity between the U.K., Europe, North America and 18 points across Southern Africa. BA passengers will be able to connect over Cape Town or Johannesburg onto Airlink services to destinations including Durban, Port Elizabeth and Skukuza in South Africa, and Walvis Bay and Windhoek in Namibia.

Knock gets Heathrow connection

IAG-owned Aer Lingus will on March 26 switch its existing London Gatwick operation from Kock in western Ireland to London Heathrow. It will operate the route daily.

Lufthansa Group

Lufthansa launches new Green Fares

Lufthansa is launching new Green Fares, which will enable passengers to offset the CO_2 emissions of their flights. Customers will pay more for their tickets, with 80% of the price premium contributed to climate protection projects and 20% used to cover the cost of using sustainable aviation fuel (SAF). As an incentive, the fares will offer additional status miles and a free rebooking option.

Swiss to resume Shanghai services

Lufthansa Group-owned Swiss will resume flights from Zurichto Shanghai from March 3. It will initially offer a weekly service, rising to three per week from April. During the summer, Swiss will also add a sixth weekly flight to Hong Kong.

Eurowings partnering with Volotea

Lufthansa-owned low-cost carrier Eurowings has signed a memorandum of understanding to enter into a sales partnership with Spanish low-cost carrier Volotea. The cooperation will cover more than 140 European routes operated by the two airlines without overlap.

Other network airlines

Aeroflot

Kazakh operation expanded

On February 1, Aeroflot restarted flights from Moscowto three destinations in Kazakhstan. It will operate up to double daily services to Astana and up to three daily services to Almaty. Aeroflot will initially offer two weekly flights to Atyrau, with a third weekly service added in March.

Tunisia services announced

Aeroflot will start regular flights from Moscow to Enfidha-Hammamet International airport from May 30. It will offer three weekly flights on the route.

Air Serbia

Tel Aviv service starting

From April 6, Air Serbia will restart thrice-weekly flights from Belgrade to Tel Aviv, after a break of almost three years.

Lisbon service starting

From April 15, Air Serbia will start twice-weekly flights from Belgrade to Lisbon.

Azerbaijan Airlines

Three European services starting

Azerbaijan Airlines will resume flights from Bakuto Barcelona on May 2. It will offer twice-weekly services. On the same day, it will also launch twice-weekly services to Vienna. Earlier, on March 18, low-cost division Buta Airways will start twice-weekly flights from Bakuto Sochi in Russia.



Two new Russian routes

Azerbaijan Airlines is planning to launch two new Russian routes from Ganja. Thrice-weekly services to Moscow will start on March 17 and will be followed by weekly flights to St Petersburg on March 19. Both services will originate in Baku.

Finnair

Profits return in final quarter of 2022

In the final quarter of 2022, Finnair increased revenue by 66% year-over-year to 687.3 million. It was profitable for a second quarter, recording a 638 million operating profit, having delivered a 600 million loss in the corresponding period in 2021. The airline's net profit amounted to more than 530 million.

Icelandair Group

Profits return on strong revenue growth

Annual revenue at Icelandair Group increased by 116% in 2022 to nearly US\$1.27 billion. Transport revenue rose by 149% to \$1.13 billion. The company rebounded from 2021's \$136 million operating loss to record a \$18.9 million profit in 2022.

SAS

Losses widen in latest quarter

During its November 2022-January 2023 quarter, SAS made an operating loss of SKr2.63 billion (US\$253 million), which was deeper than the SKr1.33 billion loss incurred during the same period a year ago.

Significant increase in January traffic

SAS posted an 89% year-over-year increase in passenger numbers to 1.43 million in January. Revenue passenger kilometers (traffic) grew by 68% on a 22% rise in capacity, lifting the airline's load factor by 18.5 points to 68%.

Virgin Atlantic

Shanghai route reopening

Virgin Atlantic will restart daily services from London Heathrow to Shanghai on May 1, its final route to be restored since the start of the pandemic.

Pakistan services suspended

Following a review of its entire network, Virgin Atlantic has decided to suspend its services to Pakistan. Flights from London Heathrow to Lahore will end on May 1 and flights to Islamabad will cease from July 9.

Low-cost carriers

Norse Atlantic Airways

More U.S. routes from Gatwick

Norse Atlantic Airways will start flights from London Gatwick to Fort Lauderdale and Orlando in late May. The four-times weekly services, which may only operate during the summer, will join the airline's existing daily Gatwick-New York service that began in August 2022.

From June 1, Norse Atlantic will also start a six-times weekly service to Washington DC, which will be followed on June 30 with daily flights to Los Angeles. The airline is also planning services to Boston and San Francisco.



Pobeda

New Middle East services starting

Aeroflot's low-cost Division Pobeda has started a daily service from Moscow's Vnukovo airport to Dubai. From March 8, it will also launch a new twice-weekly service to Istanbul from Volgograd. Pobeda is also planning to start flights to the Turkish city from Kazan, Makhachkala and Vladikavkaz.

Ryanair

January passengers soar

The number of passengers carried by Ryanair in January soared by 69% to 11.8 million from 7 million a year earlier. The airline operated with a 91% load factor.

Wizz Air

Passengers up by almost three-quarters in January

January passenger numbers at Wizz Air increased by 73% to 4.15 million. With available seats increased by 60%, the airline improved its seat factor to 86%.

Regional carriers

Air Baltic

New European routes from Tampere

Latvian regional carrier Air Baltic is to launch two new European routes from Tampere in Finland. Twiceweekly flights to Nice will start on May 2, with twice-weekly services to Milan following on May 4. Air Baltic already flies from Tampere to Amsterdam, Copenhagen, Malaga, Munich, Riga and Rhodes.

Start-up airlines and airline failures

Flyr

Airline files for bankruptcy

Norwegian start-up carrier Flyr filed for bankruptcy on February 1. The airline had warned of a critical shortterm liquidity situation following failed efforts to raise funding. It had been seeking NKr330 million (US\$32 million) to finance the summer ramp-up of its operations, improve its cash situation and pay emissions trading fees due in April.

Hans Airways

Sole aircraft returned

U.K.-based start-up Hans Airways has relinquished the sole aircraft in its fleet. With its launch hindered by the stringent financial criteria set by the regulators, the company is now looking for new investors to support its plans to start low-cost flights from Birmingham to secondary cities in India.
