

REPORT: AIRLINES: LATIN AMERICA

What you need to know

February 2023

This report presents a roundup of what's been happening to airlines in Latin America over the last month.

Major airlines

LATAM Airline Group

January passengers up by 15%

During January, LATAM Airlines Group increased monthly passenger numbers by 15% year-over-year to more than 5.98 million. With revenue passenger kilometer traffic rising by 25% on 24% extra capacity, LATAM's load factor gained 0.7 points to 81%.

New Orlando route planned

On July 1, the Colombian affiliate of LATAM Airlines Group will launch a new daily service from Bogota to Orlando. The service will be part of LATAM's joint venture with Delta Air Lines. It will compete with existing services offered on the route by Avianca and Spirit Airlines.

Low-cost carriers

Gol

Demand and loads improve in January

Brazilian carrier Gol increased passenger numbers by 11% year-over-year to 3.08 million in January. With revenue passenger kilometers growing by 9% on 6% extra capacity, Gol was able to improve its load factor by 2.1 points to 85%.

Viva Aerobus

Rising costs hold back Q4 2022 profits

Mexican low-cost carrier Viva Aerobus lifted fourth quarter 2022 revenue by 42% year-over-year to \$445 million, a figure that was also 130% higher than in the same quarter in 2019. However, with costs rising by 51%, the airline's operating profit rose by just 7% to \$68 million.

Volaris

Fourth quarter profits drop despite strong revenues

Mexican carrier Volaris increased fourth quarter 2022 revenue by 22% year-over-year to \$820 million. This was also 62% above the revenue recorded in the final quarter of 2019. A 44% rise in costs meant the airline's operating profit dropped by 59% from \$145 million to \$60 million.

January passenger numbers rise by more than one fifth

Volaris transported 3 million passengers in January, 22% more year-over-year. Domestic passenger numbers rose by 19% to 2 million. The number carried on the airline's international flights jumped by 33% to 639,000. Volaris's load factor improved by five points to 86%.

Other airlines

Copa Airlines

Q4 operating profits rise, but net income falls

Panamanian carrier Copa Airlines increased fourth quarter revenue by 55% year-over-year to \$891 million. This was also 31% above the revenue reported for the final quarter of 2019. The airline managed to lift its operating profit by 42% to almost \$220 million. However, net profits decreased by 23% to \$88 million.

New Austin service announced

Copa Airlines will launch flights from Panama City to Austin, Texas, from July 6. It will offer four flights per week on the route. The new service will the June 28 start of four-times-weekly services to Baltimore, Maryland.

Start-up airlines and failures

Aeromar

Airline ceases operations after 35 years

Mexican regional carrier Aeromar ceased all operations on February 15. The airline had suffered a series of financial problems and was unable to secure the funding needed to continue operations. Prior to the end of operations, Aeromar was relying on a fleet of 13 ATR turboprops.

Viva Air

Operations suspended

Viva Air Colombia suspended operations on February 27, blaming the move on delays in securing government approval for its plans to merge with Avianca, which would have enabled it to access muchneeded capital. It has also cited a decision by civil aviation regulator Aerocivil to recognize five other airlines as potential bidders for the airline. Aerolineas Argentinas, JetSmart, LATAM Airlines Group, Ultra Air and Wingo are all believed to have expressed an interest in acquiring Viva Air.

In the meantime, Viva Air will continue with its business restructuring, in the hope that it can restart operations in the future.
